
From the Director

The Wednesday overlap will allow us to meet an online Catechist training initiative that is being implemented by CCRESS (Catholic Conference of Religious Educators in State Schools).

Catechist Recruitment - "What works?"

We have learnt <u>not</u> to start <u>recruitment</u> with, "We need Catechists!" What tends to work better is to highlight a great good and to issue an invitation:

Come and delight in a most spiritually fulfilling mission; instantly become part of a wider family; our Parish kids in state schools are hungry to hear the story of Jesus and the joy and hope he brings, and we love serving them.

"Three barriers" to volunteers stepping forward to be Catechists, which clergy and existing Catechists may be able to break down are:

"I don't know enough about my faith" (show a simple lesson – you can teach this – start as a helper)
"I want to take holidays without being hampered by a weekly commitment" (we have backup support – the fact is, it is easier to cover a 6-8 week cruise than a whole school year)
"I doubt if I can handle a classroom full of kids" (we have training, in class support and we can assist in preparation)
Many parishioners simply need your reassurance to gain the confidence to work with their cleray to evangelise and catechise "on and beyond" Sunday.

From the Director

"The bottom line" is that, in terms of the all-important recruitment of Catechists, in those parishes where clergy regularly make their Catechist Coordinators and Catechists known to other parishioners, we have ample Catechists.

Wisdom from our Catechists/CCD Admin Coordinators: Laura Argiro informed me that having a Children's Activity book on hand works well when recruiting to show how easy the lessons are with the step-by-step teachers' guide. The above "three blockages" were clearly shared by Julia Goff at the Southern Area Coordinators Meeting so, together, Laura and Julia are now working with your FEOs to update our Parish SRE Handbook and the recruitment promotion pack materials.

Priests, Deacons, Pastoral Associates, Parish Staff

CCD needs the help of clergy to ensure that your Parish Catechists receive initial and ongoing training in enjoyable and creative catechesis, classroom management, safeguarding, and the use of the approved curriculum that the CCD publishes and distributes. The Archbishop gives an Annual Assurance to the NSW Education Department Director of Schools that all of our Catechists have this training in place. We need to hit these training marks and adhere to this assurance throughout the year to fulfil our obligations for the sake of providing good catechesis to our Parish children in state schools.

Revision of CCD training for Parish Catechists

Initial training: CCD Sydney is currently revising its training courses commencing by combining the Basic One and Basic Two courses starting in 2017. The "induction" part of this initial training must be completed prior to any new catechists taking a class on their own and by all helpers. The remaining initial training is to be completed within their first year.

Ongoing training: The Intermediate, Advanced and Catechist Ministry Certificate course topics will be revised in 2017 to meet new requirements and identified needs, e.g. with respect to classroom management, use of the approved curriculum and faith development, for the sake of keeping up with the times and new challenges in providing creative and enjoyable catechesis. Secondary SRE will be looked at from two perspectives: Training of secondary teachers and program/resources.

SAFEGUARDING BITES:

Photographing and Videoing of Children and Young People

It is important that you ensure you have all necessary consents/permissions prior to taking or publishing any images of children and young people at parish events. There may be times when there is a legitimate reason why a child should not have their photograph or image publicised to protect their safety. Therefore, please ensure you have parents/guardians sign the photography consent/permission form prior to any Parish events.

Catechist Safeguarding and Child Protection training

The Archdiocese's new Safeguarding office is currently providing clergy and parish secretaries with safeguarding and child protection training.

CCD is also standardising its safeguarding and child protection with the Archdiocesan training so that clergy and catechists receive the same information.

In collaborating with the Safeguarding Office, the CCD training will take into account the specific needs of Special Religious Education (SRE) Teachers (i.e. Catechists) so that we can all comply with the NSW Department of Education's school policies and procedures for the sake of providing good learning experiences for our children in state schools.

CCD is currently piloting this updated safeguarding training and we will be contacting your parish to arrange training times for Catechists.

Dear Catechist Coordinators,

We notice a recent trend has developed by some parishes when ordering their annual COLAL and sacramental books simultaneously at the start of each year. Bundling orders in this way will not only save in postage costs but also in administration and reduce delays due to miscalculation of students numbers.



If, for example, you intend ordering 15 books it may be fruitful to order 20 books to give you some margin in case of increased student participation.

We are currently in the process of topping up our curriculum stocks and are pleased to advise there will be no price increase for next year. Orders can be placed as early as mid-November if you wish to receive stock before Christmas.


Bulk order forms will be mailed out to all participating parishes in October 2016. Alternatively order forms can be accessed via our website.

MUSIC MATTERS

Music in the SRE Classroom

Music plays an important role in our Catholic faith and can be incorporated into religious education for children of all ages. Music has a unique power to touch a person's whole being – physically, mentally and spiritually. Music has the ability to move people and bring out the full message by expressing inner feelings and attitudes.

Music is a powerful learning tool. If you don't use much music in your classroom, give it a try, it will make an immediate impact. If you do use music, think of ALL the ways you can be using it to make your classroom a warmer, more effective learning environment.

Mood music will create an environment. Just as you take care to make your learning environment visually appealing and stimulating, you should also note the effect that music has on the atmosphere in the classroom.

Message music sums up the lesson, making memorisation painless. One of the great things about using music is that people don't forget songs. How many of you when asked to name the Beatitudes start singing in your mind? Story songs are available with biblical stories, helping children identify with these characters and prayer music or hymns are often used to begin or end a lesson.

Add rhythm by clapping or swaying.


 Experiment with movement, either spontaneous or planned, expressing outwardly what is inwardly experienced.

☐ Try drawing a picture of the song.

☐ Use again and again – children love familiar songs.

Remember, children learn by all their senses being involved. When you use songs that can be taught through gestures, very little pre-teaching is necessary.

Most children will sing along right away, but even the children who aren't ready to sing will be able to participate with gestures.

Greetings to all in the Central Area,

A big thank you to all those coordinators who attended our

meeting in late July and came armed with plenty of feedback on CCD operations and suggestions as to how we can improve. We exist to help serve you, our volunteers, and I hope that we can continue to evaluate our methods so that you and all SRE students and their families benefit.

It seems like ages now since we celebrated our Area Mass. For the first time in our history, our High School Catechists from La Salle Bankstown joined us, and it was lovely to see Catechists of all ages gather to give thanks to God for our work and ask Him to bless it.

It has come to my attention that some schools are asking for 100 points of ID from our catechists. Please note that this is not necessary. Some schools are unaware of DET guidelines - you're only obliged to give your Parish your WWCC and the Parish handles the rest with a letter from the Parish Priest listing serving catechists.

A reminder yet again that ALL teachers and helpers who are in the classroom MUST do their Basic One before commencing their teaching. This is a legal requirement. It was during the census that I realised this protocol is not always being followed, and while I understand the urgency in placing new volunteers, I am happy to fill in until you have found someone suitable.

We're hearing great stories of young people who have returned from World Youth Day with renewed vigour and zeal for their faith. If there are any attending your parish, why not ask the Parish Priest to discuss having them as relief catechists? A great back-up is essential - the perfect insurance for a catechist who is away on holidays or suddenly fallen ill.

This year we're celebrating two additional Catholic High Schools: Holy Spirit Lakemba and De La Salle Ashfield. Seeing teenagers want to pass on their faith is wonderful in and of itself, but when it pays off in their returning to the ministry in their adult years, it's amazing! If there's a Catholic School in your area that is in close proximity to a state school, let me know and I'll chat with them about having some High School Assistants in with you.

Right now, we are in the midst of preparing for our Annual Catechist Mass, which is the area Mass on a grander scale. I'd like to thank those who have volunteered so far for roles in the Mass. I'm still in need of ushers to help people to their seats, as well as anyone who might be able to set up the food and drinks in the hall. Please call or email me if you'd like to assist.

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Hello to all Catechists in the Northern Area,

Congratulations to the Northern area awardees who will be receiving their service awards at the Annual Catechist Mass. This year the Mass has been changed to Sunday 9th October 2016 at 2pm.

I have recently become aware that catechists are eager to use the smart board lessons in their classroom but have been having issues downloading the software. There are a number of reasons why this is the case but one main reason could be software. Smart board Notebook 11.4 software is not compatible with Windows 10 or Mac OSX versions, thus will not work on your home computer.

Previously we have stated that in order to use the Electronic COLAL [Christ Our Light and Life] lessons, you must have the Smart Board Notebook software downloaded on your home computer or laptop. We have recently discovered that there is another alternative by using an online solution. Catechists can view the electronic lessons on the USB by using the online tool Smart tech express, located at http://express.smarttech.com this is a very basic and an expressed version of Smart board that allows you to open up the lessons and view them without downloading any software on your home computer and is compatible with Windows 10 or Mac OSX.

Recently Homebush Boys High School held the first Catholic Scripture class in over 30 years. I am delighted to announce that considering it was the first class, we had 147 Catholic boys from year 7 to year 12 attend the seminar. Next year in 2017, Homebush Boys High School plan to have weekly classes. If any catechist feels called to teach in the High School, please let me know.

It was lovely to see everyone at the Northern Area Mass at St Joan of Arc Haberfield. A big thank you must go to the Coordinator Greg Hill for all the work and preparation that was done to make it so successful.

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A final term for preparation for 2017! Welcome to Term Four, and whilst this term is the shortest of the terms, it certainly is the busiest as we prepare for the coming of Our Lord and Saviour Jesus at Christmas, prepare our Christmas pageants, look towards 2017 in regard to recruitment and book orders and wind down towards the celebration of Christmas with family and friends.

In Term 2 we had a celebration of the Eastern Area Mass, and I wish to thank Mr. John Spora, Coordinator, Daceyville Parish and the team of catechists for hosting the Eastern Area Mass. It was an uplifting time of prayer, thanksgiving and celebration. Thank you to Father Moses Kim and to the con-celebrating priests of the Eastern Area and to all who attended and made the day a special one.

Please remember that any new catechists or helpers or assistants or standby catechists must hold a current WWCC, be verified by their parish(s) and complete a BAC Level One course.

Classroom Management Tips

The final tips for 2016, I wish to focus on lesson planning, resources, maximising classroom time, discipline and challenging behaviours. These tips will certainly help us in our term meetings in 2017 and with our catechists and providing support to any new catechists.

Planning my lesson

As I sit with a cup of coffee next to me and prepare my lesson, I go through the first page of the lesson which contains the lesson number, title, teaching focus, learning outcomes, catechism and scripture reference and most importantly, the recommended resources. If you haven't already noticed, our lessons are both liturgically arranged and consecutive, in other words they follow the Church's liturgical season, so when we are celebrating Easter, we should be focused on lessons 8 or 9. Consecutive simply means that the lessons follow each other, a previous lesson on the Gifts of the Holy Spirit follows a lesson on the Mission of St Paul living these gifts, as an example.

Without fail my preparation always involves a highlighter and red pen. I highlight what I will be asking, reading or explaining to the students and on the left side margin, I write prompts such as 'ask', or 'read', or 'explain', or 'invite students to read', or go to 'student activity books' etc. I also keep in mind the suggested time frames as this helps me to keep within the time allotted and to ensure good classroom time management practices.

Always visualise how you wish each class to be and affirm in your thoughts some positive affirmation e.g. 'I am always positive, I deliver my lessons with enthusiasm and love'. Try not to be too harsh on yourself should the lesson not turn out as you envisioned it. Make a note on what went wrong and re-address or debrief with your Coordinator, other catechists or your FEO. You can only improve with each lesson.

Use of Resources

With any resources I use whether they are Br Julian Quinlan's resources, Smart Board, Big Books, items off the internet or flash cards used via MSWord, I ensure these are placed in the order of the lesson plan. This ensures the flow of the lesson is smooth and the scheduled time frame is adhered.

Maximising my classroom time

Importantly, I aim to arrive at the classroom at least 5 or 10 minutes prior to commencement, as I have the luxury of accessing the classroom prior to the students entering [if you do not have this luxury, your preparation at home is vital]. For the Years 3 to 6 classes I ensure all the books are sorted on a desk for the students to collect as they enter. The remaining books tells me who hasn't turned up to class and are used to mark the roll which is taken either while the students are working or after they have left.

Discipline and Challenging Behaviours

Discipline strategies are also crucial. My discipline is often 'on the run'. I do not allow unnecessary chatter or comments or questions to creep into the lesson. Remember you and I are in control of the lesson, not the other way around. If you find yourself with a challenging student, always seek assistance from the classroom teacher or the person responsible for SRE at your school or simply the Principal. Never suffer in silence, people are there to help, all you need to do is ASK!

I hope these tips are of some help. Remember that our Basic One and Basic Two courses are FREE and available to assist you. You can choose to do them as many times as you feel necessary.

I would like to thank you all for your continued work in this Apostolate and may God reward you for your time and efforts in sharing the wonderful gift of faith. I wish you, your families and friends a most blessed and holy Christmas. May 2017 bring a renewed love for Jesus and His Church.

World Youth Day 2016

They say it's not the destination that matters but the journey. Those who have been on World Youth Day know better; it is both. For those of us who were sent with the CCD to Prague and then Krakow, it was the journey that prepared us for our destination. In turn, it was the destination that made the journey worthwhile. The trying flights, frustrating accommodations, and fatigue in a way sanctified us for the experience of meeting our big extended family in Poland, the youth of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church. The destination itself was of monumental significance as it was the birthplace of one of the youth's most beloved saints, Pope Saint John Paul II. The youth of the Church will always come together with familiarity and goodwill wherever they meet, but there was a special something – a spark - of the late Polish Pope humming through us as we walked through the streets that he once walked.

The CCD group – three girls, three boys, Laura Argiro and myself – started our pilgrimage in Prague. It was here that we were first acquainted with the reality of daily Mass. It was not long after we had flung our bags into our room that it was time for Mass. It soon became our daily joy and source of strength. I know I don't only speak for myself when I say that it is one of the aspects of the pilgrimage that we miss most. We visited the Infant Jesus of Prague and had the opportunity to bring all our hopes and anxieties to the Holy Infant that so many before us had fled to throughout history. We were honoured with the opportunity of having our very own Mass in the church of the Holy Infant. The rest of our time in Prague was spent exploring the gorgeous streets, buildings and churches. We visited the Castle district and we were given a tour of the beautiful St Vitus Cathedral (this one is worth a google search). The open-air markets of Prague proved to be the place to find weird and wonderful souvenirs.

It was soon time to make the journey to Poland and Czestochowa was the first place on our itinerary. It was at the Monastery of Jasna Gora that the spirit of World Youth Day caught alight within the hearts of the youth. This was the place where we first prayed together as a group after we had seen the Black Madonna. The monastery was brimming with pilgrims from all over the globe and the CCD youth could sense that the big family reunion was close at hand; the atmosphere was one of excitement and anticipation. It was also in Jasna Gora that we attended an Aussie pilgrims Mass and it was this Mass that has stood out as one of the most meaningful and powerful experiences of the CCD group. This was due to a compelling combination of the sheer grandeur of the chapel, the majestic music, and the hundreds of people kneeling in adoration on the stone floor of the pew-less space. This was quite unlike most Masses they had attended in Sydney and the youth were hungry for more. The week that followed was one of quick pace, elated spirits and sore feet.

The World Youth Day week in Krakow brought with it millions of youth from all over the world. Any street you turned down would have scores of pilgrims from almost every country singing, cheering, greeting and swapping items such as flags with other pilgrims. The group enjoyed conversing with all the different nationalities as well as all the different religious orders that we encountered on our daily outings in to the city of John Paul II. Each morning we had Catechesis for the English speaking pilgrims in a large tent in a park near our accommodation, that was then followed by some central event such as the opening Mass or the Stations of the Cross. In the evening we would go to praise and worship concerts or else recover from the long day and wind down in preparation for the next. My highlight of Krakow was kneeling in the soggy grasses of Bolonia Park during the opening Mass and watching as a glorious and blinding sun broke through the previously rainy, grey clouds just in time for the consecration of the Eucharist. You could have heard a pin drop, everyone was so quiet and reverent and awestruck. Though we all spoke different languages, we all shared the heart's quiet language of love for Jesus in the Most Blessed Sacrament.

Unlike any World Youth Day that had gone before, there was scheduled time after the World Youth Day week for a retreat in the mountains of Zakopane. This was the favourite retreat place of John Paul II and it was here that we reflected on our life-altering pilgrimage experience. We walked through the valleys, visited local churches and said final goodbyes to the other Aussie pilgrims in this place of beauty, simplicity and rest. Before we knew it, it was time to head home and we packed with tired arms and a full heart. The final hours of our pilgrimage were marked by expressions of gratitude and fraternity, a desire to follow God in our lives back at home, and a longing to see the loved ones we left in Sydney over two weeks before.

To say that World Youth Day was an incredible experience would be to sell it short. God galvanised each member of our CCD group with a renewed desire to follow Him in all that we do. It was due to the generosity of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine that we were able to go on this pilgrimage and it is with an appreciative heart that I want to thank the CCD office for sending our group. I would not be surprised if a few catechists come out of our group in the years to come. I ask you to pray for us that we may remain steadfast in this endeavour and that by our daily witness we may draw others to seek a relationship with the God that loves us even to death on a cross.
