

Experienced or new, here are some tips for the beginning of the year

- Learn the students' names use name tags, seating arrangements, class roll, etc.
- Set the class rules and consequences keep rules few, simple and clear. You could check the school rules and consequences. Most primary schools display these in the classroom. This avoids duplication and re-inventing the wheel.
- With infants' classes, try the five "L's":

Look at the teacher Lips still Legs crossed (when students sit on the floor) Hands on lap Ears listen

- Develop a routine or structure with the class how they enter the classroom, move from one activity to the next, allocate tasks for students each week, e.g. distribution of books, prayer place set up, etc.
- Make prayer and the prayer space an integral part of your lesson. Allow time for prayers at the beginning and end of lessons. This is in your teacher's manual.
- Promote classroom discussions rather than lengthy periods of teacher talk. A student's attention span is their age plus one year, i.e. if they are six years old, their attention span is seven minutes. Most of our instruction should be brief, encouraging the students to share answers and guiding them through the activities.
- Don't just settle for read-discuss-read-discuss. Engage your students in the 'I Wonder' questions. Allow time for students to ponder over the questions. This will hold their attention and enthusiasm. This is in your teacher's manual.
- Always have a backup plan in case the technology fails.
- Read your teacher's manual, whether it is new or familiar to you. You need to be familiar with each lesson and aware of the aim of the lesson, the 'TO REMEMBER'.
- A great teacher will reflect after each lesson. Take the time to think through what worked and what didn't work in your lesson.

Remember...You are not just the teacher of a subject, you are a witness to a living, loving relationship with God. As Pope Saint Paul VI said, "Modern man listens more willingly to witnesses than to teachers and if he does listen to teachers, it is because they are witnesses."

NO PHOTO in classroom POLICY

From our initial induction/refresher Level 1 SRE Catechist training, you will recall the "NSW Department of Education Code of Conduct"...

SRE Teachers (Catechists and Assistants) are to be aware of the NSW Department of Education Code of Conduct, which includes the "Social Media Policy" and act in accordance with the conduct described in it. Of particular note in the "Social Media Policy" is Section 23; see: https://education.nsw.gov.au/policy-library, and click on "People" policy group.

Simply put:

- no photos to be taken of students
- no "be-friending" on private Facebook accounts
- refer to your Level 1.1 SRE Safeguarding Code of Conduct workbook

Project Compassion

We do not collect Project Compassion fundraising money from students in public schools. Rather we raise their awareness of the needs of others, via teaching our authorised curriculum. If students say they do want to contribute, catechists simply direct them to ask their parents/carers to go to their local parish to do so.

TEACHING LENT AND HOLY WEEK LESSONS

Lent is a time the Church prepares to celebrate the great feast of Easter. In Kindergarten, we introduce the students to the Prayer Place and use a purple prayer cloth – purple because we are preparing for a feast. In years 1-6 we cover the Lenten practices of prayer, almsgiving and fasting at an age appropriate level.

In Holy week we remember how much Jesus loved us. The students will learn that Jesus died for us on Good Friday and rose to new life on Easter Sunday. This is taught across the years in an age appropriate manner.

The Scope and Sequence in your Teacher's Manual gives you some idea of what is taught in each year level.

LENT AND HOLY WEEK

STAGE ONE (K, Year 1, Year 2)

- Holy Week: the washing of the feet and the Last Supper.
- Easter Sunday: we celebrate Jesus rising to a new life.
- Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent.
- Lent is a time to grow in

- love.
- Palm Sunday is the first day in Holy Week.
- Easter Sunday: we celebrate Jesus rising to a new life.
- Lent: we prepare for Easter.
- Holy Week: we remember Jesus' love for us.
- Jesus is the light of the world.
- Easter Sunday: we celebrate Jesus rising to new life.

STAGE TWO (Year 3 and Year 4)

- Lent: we try to do something in our lives to bring us closer to Jesus.
- Holy Week: Jesus teaches us how much he loves us.
- Jesus rose from the dead on Easter Sunday.
- Lent: a time for change almsgiving and making sacrifices.
- Holy Week: the Stations of the Cross.
- Rejoice Jesus is risen.

STAGE THREE (Year 5 and Year 6)

- During Lent we are called to reach out to others as Jesus did.
- Lent is the season of forty days when we prepare to celebrate the death and Resurrection of the Lord Jesus during Holy Week and Easter.
- In Holy Week we remember the rejection, suffering, death and Resurrection of Our Lord Jesus Christ.
- The Easter vigil is the most important liturgy of the Church calendar.

- Lent a time for sacrifice.
- Lent a time for change.
- In Lent, the Church calls us to pray more, to make sacrifices and to give to the poor.
- On Holy Thursday we remember the Last Supper.
- In Holy Week the Church remembers that Jesus, in being faithful to his mission suffered and was crucified.
- Hope in the Risen Lord.

Raising awareness of Care and Compassion

The Christ our Light and Life (COLAL) Teacher's Manual sets out how to introduce children to reflect upon doing good works and caring for others in age-appropriate ways

In the COLAL curriculum, there are Lenten lessons that feature *Project Compassion* (See Year 5 Lesson 4; Year 6 Lesson 2). Each year Project Compassion is run by a Catholic aid agency called Caritas.

The word 'Caritas' is a Latin word that means 'Love + Compassion'.

The Caritas aid agency helps to support long-term development programs in impoverished communities in Africa, Asia, Indigenous Australia and the Pacific. Caritas works to help people to rediscover their dignity by taking greater control over their lives in overcoming poverty.

IMPORTANT: we DO NOT collect Project Compassion fundraising money from our students in public schools.

Instead, we raise awareness of the need to care for others, ourselves and our environment.

To help us raise awareness, Caritas has provided school-age-appropriate Prayer and Reflection resources on their website https://lent.caritas.org.au/page/schools which the following page of computer screen images show.

If a student in your Scripture asks you if they can contribute to *Project Compassion*, you can help them to pray a prayer with the whole class; you could then suggest that they talk with their parents about how their family cares for each other and helps people in their neighbourhood; and, that their parents can help them to find out more about Project Compassion through their local parish church community.

10 Essential Tips for Understanding Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD)



1. Students with ASD don't have to look at you all the time.

Reason: They find looking and listening at the same time hard to do.

2. Give them time to answer any of your questions.

Reason: They have slower processing time. Sometimes it can take them up to a minute to formulate the answer in the correct sequence.

3. If they feel pressured they will answer with stock standard answers.

Reason: They know it will get them out of trouble quickly. This may include: "I don't know", "yes", "maybe" and often this isn't their true answer!

4. They often don't "generalise" information between people and places.

Reason: Homework for teacher 'x' is in the yellow basket but for teacher 'y' it's to be placed in the green basket.

5. They find organisation of their school equipment very difficult.

Reason: They are best with one folder with everything inside. Limit the number of pencils,

6. Limit their choices and be very specific with choices.

Reason: They find choices overwhelming and are often concerned with making wrong choice due to their difficulty with problem solving.

7. Be as clear, concise and concrete as possible.

Reason: People with ASD have difficulty with abstract thinking.

8. Avoid verbal overload.

Reason: They are visual learners and verbal information takes them longer to process and retain.

- 9. Avoid verbal arguments by redirecting them to what they should be doing. E.g. "Start your work". **Reason:** They often enjoy verbal arguments.
- 10. Simple changes in the environment can make a big difference to a child's engagement and learning outcomes.

Reason: People with ASD have sensory processing difficulties and this can cause behaviour

Top 12 Tips to **Set Up for Success**



- 1. Understand the child's difference (strengths and challenges), accept their different way of thinking, learning, socialising, etc.
- 2. Break it down. Break tasks down into smaller parts and give them each step sequentially. If possible, give them a checklist to mark off as they do each step. Do NOT expect the children to multitask! Allow them extra time to get it done, but let them finish! It is important to finish one task before going to another.
- 3. Slow it down. Be aware of communication difficulties. Allow time to process verbal information, use visuals, and don't overload them with verbal information.
- 4. Use their special interests to motivate and engage their strengths are motivated by their interest.
- 5. Show them what is expected and what is happening, then they have less need to fight for control (i.e. schedules, routines, timers).
- 6. Be careful how you use words, their literalness can mean they misunderstand you. Avoid words like 'could', 'would', 'can' as they perceive them as a choice, e.g. "Can you start work" can be seen as a
- 7. Use visuals to support learning: schedules, photos, pictures, symbols, timetables, highlight key information, mind maps, etc.
- 8. Prepare by previewing. If possible 'preview' the learning ahead of time, to give a mental framework of what is being presented or what is next.
- 9. Check in regularly don't wait for the student to ask for help check in (learning, social and behaviour).
- 10. Computers and iPads are enabling for so many people with ASD, they can help build connections and confidence.
- 11. They find it hard to see things from other people's perspective. This is known as 'theory of mind'. They might also find it hard to understand and predict other people's behaviour, and to understand how their behaviour affects others.
- 12. They often find it hard to recognise facial expressions and the emotions behind them. They may miss facial cues from adults about behaviour, or social cues from peers.

Catechist Reflection

A Reflection you could use at your catechist meeting...

'Let the children come to me' - Luke 7:16

PRAYER PLACE: Lay out a green cloth for Ordinary Time. You will need a bible, a teacher's manual and the Parish candle. (Light the Parish candle.)

LEADER: As we prepare to go about our work as catechists, let us reflect for a moment on the emphasis the Scriptures place on children. (Place the Bible on the Prayer Place.) In the book of Proverbs, the writer repeatedly addresses young people.

READER: Proverbs 2

"My child, learn what I teach you and never forget what I tell you to do. Listen to what is wise and try to understand it. Yes, beg for knowledge; plead for insight."

LEADER: Let us pray that we may be effective teachers of God's Word.

PRAYER 1: For each of us gathered here. May our hearts and minds be filled with the fruits of the spirit; love, joy, peace and patience as we bring the message of God's love to the students we teach. Help us to be good role models to our students. We pray to the Lord.

ALL: Lord, hear our prayer.

READER: Luke 18: 15-17

Some people brought their babies to Jesus for him to place his hands on them. The disciples saw them

ALL: Lord, hear our prayer.



60 Years in Australia

In Australia, the CCD today is a parish support agency with a long history that reveals the importance of catechesis and ongoing renewal for mission.

Many other "historical soundings" point to the important place of catechesis in renewal; for instance, French philosopher-theologian, Jean Gerson (1363-1429), asserted that Church renewal begins with the religious instruction of the young and, later, apostolic religious orders, such as the Marists in the early-mid 1800s, reached out and catechised whole families through teaching children when, after the French revolutions, up to four generations had not been sent a priest.

CCD's Historical Context: 1536-1962

1536: CCD has its origins in 16th Century Milan, Italy. Abbate Castellino da Castello founded the Society of Christian Doctrine to enable laity to catechise other laity in response to a religious-social upheaval issuing from "over the Alps" – a "reformation" – that challenged the inappropriate selling of blessings and how God is present to us through the sacraments.

This initiative was supported by the Archbishop of Milan, Saint Charles Borromeo, who directed that this work take part in all parishes in his Archdiocese.

Early 1560s:

- a wealthy Milanese nobleman, Marco de Sadis-Cusani, joined by a number of associates, priests and laymen, took the Society of Christian Doctrine to Rome to instruct both children and adults.
- This was greatly extended by Henri Pietra of Piacenza who left his business, became a priest, and, with help from Saint Philip Neri, brought many to encounter God. The Society then became known as the "Confraternity of Christian Doctrine"

1571: Pope Pius V calls for the CCD to be established in every Parish.

1686: Pope Innocent XI's encyclical again

recommends the establishment of CCD to all Bishops.

1905: Pope Pius X, Acerbo Nimis, calls for the CCD "to be canonically established in each and every parish ... in all dioceses of the world" in acknowledging clerical scarcity and the importance of catechetical formation of clergy and lay catechists.

1920s-1930s: Pope Pius X, concerned that the catechetical provisions of The Code of Canon Law (1917) were not being adopted, reiterates the call for the catechetical movement to be promoted universally – see Orben Catholicum (1923) and Provido sane consilio (1935).


Foundations of CCD in Australia

When English settlers arrived in Botany Bay, a significant number of their convict prisoners were Irish Catholics, who were banned from practicing their faith.

Over the years, Catholics in Australia – convicts and free people combined – petitioned the government for priests to attend to their sacramental and service needs. There were riots, floggings and rebellions, but eventually they were able to build a Cathedral in Sydney and churches in other parts of the colony.

When Archbishop Bede Polding, the first Bishop of Australia arrived, he split the colony into dioceses including Sydney, Parramatta, Campbelltown, Maitland, Bathurst, Goulburn and more – many of which remain today.

Teaching children was the responsibility of local priests who travelled around to communities to teach and minister. As the colony grew beyond a settlement for convicts, the government took more of an interest in children's education and passed the Public Instruction Act 1880 that made education a state matter – it had to be free, non-church and compulsory. Time was set aside for Special Religious Education (taught by the clergy), but as the Catholic education system grew, Catholics were directed by the Bishops to send their children to Catholic schools;



if this was not practical, due to distance for instance, dispensation had to be sought from their Parish Priest.

The historical information below demonstrates how SRE continues as a partnership between Church and State that benefits our multicultural, multi-faith society today.

Australian pastoral context of Catholic students in State Schools

Context: to favour the establishment of a Catholic school system in Australia, Catholic clergy were not allowed to teach religion in State Schools, given Cardinal Moran's concern for the spiritual welfare of Catholic children.

1918: The Sisters of Charity establish the Teresians, a group of lay women to help prepare state school Catholic children to receive the sacraments.

1934: Australian Bishops officially lift the prohibition on lay Catholic catechists entering State schools whilst clergy are still prohibited. Catholic parents who enroll their child in a state school where a Catholic school is available are deemed guilty of a mortal sin.

1936: Acknowledgement of pastoral needs of Catholic students in state schools is highlighted by Rev O'Connor, Sydney Archdiocese's Inspector of Schools.

1938: Archbishop Kelly provides indults for CCD to be established in Sydney parishes in accordance with the 1917 Code of Canon Law, no. 711 §2.

1945: The Catholic Weekly reports that over 300 Catechist Guild teachers are giving religious instruction to 5,465 Catholic students in State schools.

1951: Diocesan Synod of Sydney reiterates the

policy of the past 70 years: "Parents who send their children to non-Catholic schools without the requisite permission are guilty of grave sin" (NB: the context is concern for children's spiritual welfare).

28 Sept 1955: Sydney Archdiocese survey reveals 18,000 Catholic children attend State Schools.

20 Dec 1955: At the Sydney Archdiocese Clergy Conference, Cardinal Gilroy states: "Every Public School must be visited regularly. Instruction should also be given outside school hours if practicable."

26 June 1957: Cardinal Gilroy calls for the CCD to be officially (re-) established in the Archdiocese of Sydney

1958: Sydney's Auxiliary Bishop (later Cardinal) James Freeman was tasked with the establishment of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine in Sydney, which then spread throughout Australia.

1960: CCD archives: "The Cardinal asked that thought be given to ways of improving the catechetics at Manly [Seminary]."

Fr Ron Hine, CCD Secretariat, requests Fr James Madden, Seminary Rector, to consider introducing a catechetics course for seminarians. Fr Hine sees the need to complete theoretical training with practical catechetical experience.

1962: Cardinal Gilroy to Fr Ron Hine, "I am deeply grateful for all that you personally have done to assist the young priests to teach Catechism. This is a most important exercise of Sacred Ministry" (Gilroy, 1962).

CCD today

CCD (Sydney) supports 1900 Parish catechists who teach 27,000 students in 330 schools around the Archdiocese.

CCD Faith Education Officers (FEOs) liaise with parishes and public schools to uphold both child safety and educational requirements of our Archdiocese and government to enable us to pray with and teach children in our public schools.

To uphold and develop these requirements, in consultation with the NSW Department of Education, CCD Sydney collaborates with the eleven other NSW Catholic dioceses who form the Catholic Conference of Religious Educators in State Schools (CCRESS), the Inter-Church Commission of Religious Educators in State Schools (ICCOREIS) and the All Faiths SRE group. CCD agencies also collaborate nationally via the National CCD forum.






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
